Hi students, welcome back to Counselor's Corner!

We wanted to take some time today to outline how grades work in high school, especially for new students and 9th graders. Each of you have received progress reports already, which are given halfway through each 9-week term. Each term is 9 weeks long, and there are four each year. Term 1 and 2 (along with the final exam for each class), are made into a Semester 1 grade. There are two semesters per year. Term 3 and 4 (and the final exams for each class) factor into a Semester 2 grade. Report cards come out at the end of each

term, you will receive four report cards (one for each term),

but those grades do not end up on your transcript. Your transcript is a record of your high school grades, GPA, class rank, courses taken, etc. It's a really important document that's needed for college and entering the workforce after high school! The grades that go on a transcript are your Semester grades. So your cumulative GPA will change after each semester, NOT after every term.

Your 9th grade year is incredibly important to establish a high GPA. The longer you are in high school, the less your GPA moves up or down as you continue to take more classes each year. So stay strong in 9th grade, as it'll be really hard to dig

your way out of a low GPA if you start out low. Utilize study tables after school in the media center, ask your teachers for help, ask your counselor for assistance to find outside tutoring resources, as well. We are here for you!

For this issue of the Book Nook, I will review the memoir "Strangers Assume My Girlfriend is My Nurse" by Shane Burcaw. This is the second book written by Burcaw, who has written a successful blog for several years. He also has a YouTube channel that stars he and his girlfriend (Squirmy and Grubs).

Upon first glance of this memoir, readers would assume that each chapter is about his day-to-day life living with Spinal Muscular Atrophy. However, there is so much more to this story than what meets the eye. Spinal Muscular Atrophy is a genetic muscular disorder that targets the muscles used for movement. The muscles normally worsen with age. What the reader quickly discovers is that these humorous stories are actually about learning to let your guard down, the importance of family, and the deep connection we all have with love.

Readers will quickly realize that Burcaw tackles his disability with fierce humor, which is what drew me to this reading this book. One chapter talks extensively about using his expensive wheelchair to navigate the beach to finally see the ocean.

Another discusses his fear of being alone, and not being able to save himself from intruders. Eventually Burcaw discusses the relationship between he and his girlfriend, Hannah. Again, on the surface their relationship seems different, however, it isn't different at all. The stories of their lives and their travels, are truthful, light-hearted, and based on a mutual love and respect.

I would recommend "Strangers Assume My Girlfriend is My Nurse." I love that Burcaw tackles situations that on the

Both of Burcaw's memoirs are available for checkout in the Clay High School Library



This event's list of supposed future attendees quickly skyrocketed from the thousands to millions long before the posted date of the raid, September 20th. However, when the day of the raid finally came, only about 150 of these attendees made it. And instead of a triumphant race into the facility, military personnel faced down a crowd of people who simply stood around the main gate, miles from the facility itself. For months, millions of people had raved and posted countless memes of this event only for it to simply fizzle out into a mere shadow of its promised size. So what happened?

Unfortunately for those who were expecting a high turnout, the incredibly vast majority of those who signed up for the event simply did so as a joke. In fact, the entire raid was supposed to simply be a joke as stated by the creator of the event, Matty Roberts, who denounced the authenticity of the event and denied his involvement in any possible arrests or deaths. DC UNIVERSE





Rambling thru October 2019 AD Skies


Highlighting a Lower Sun, Less Daylight and More Darkness

So what does October 2019 have to offer us astronomically? Each day the Sun, on its journey southward, climbs higher in our sky during the period of time we measure as sunrise to noon. It is at its highest at "noon" for all day. From noon to sunset it drops in altitude in our sky. During October the noon Sun will decrease in altitude and noon shadows will increase in length. By Halloween the noon Sun will be about 340 above the due south point of our horizon.

On October 1st the Sun will rise in South Bend about 7:41am and set about 7:26pm. At the end of this month (on Halloween) it will rise about 8:16am and set about 6:39pm. Daylight will last for about

11 hours and 45 minutes on the 1st. By the 31st the amount of daylight will decrease to about 10 hours and 23 minutes. What you lose in daylight each day you gain in darkness in order to maintain a 24 hour "day". Because the Sun continues to rise and set further south of east and west each day of this month, you will continue to loose daylight and gain darkness and length of darkness will be greater than length of daylight.

The Moon will be in its 1st Quarter phase on October 5th, Full on the 13th, 3rd Quarter on the 21st and New on the 27th. Yes there will be a Full Moon on Friday



the 13th. The Waxing Crescent Moon, along with the planets Saturn and Jupiter, will grace the skies in the southwest after sunset the evening of October 31st. The Moon will be at Apogee (furthest from Earth) on the 10th and will be at Perigee (closest to Earth) on the 26th. October's Full Moon was called the Hunter's Moon because this was the time to hunt in preparation for winter.

Mars is your October "morning stars". The October "evening stars" will be Venus, Jupiter and Saturn in that order from west to east. As was true last month a variety of nighttime constellations will be visible, from Scorpius in the west after sunset to Orion in the east before sunrise. You can still enjoy such bright as Antares in Scorpius and Betelgeuse and Rigel

in Orion.

Don't forget to check out Polaris, the Big Dipper, the Little Dipper, the King, the Queen and the Dragon in your northern sky.

Closing Thought: People are prisoners of their phones. That's why they are called "cell" phones.

So: May your skies always be clear, may your eyes always look upward. . .and, no matter how you believe, may you always "feel" the beauty and mysteries of the Universe.
