




best that she can be. She explained how the academic side of school was never overwhelming, but the extracurriculars were stressful to keep up with.

# The Return of the Motorola Razr

On November 13, Motorola announced the creation of a new, foldable smartphone modeled after the classic Motorola Razr. Almost immediately, the media quickly responded with some praising its innovative recreation of old designs and others were surprised by the return of such an old, nostalgic device. For many people, the original Motorola Razr was their first true cell phone; and even those who never owned one still recognize its compact folding design. As such, Motorola's goal seems to be to capture the nostalgia of the classic flip phone with a few new tricks up its sleeve; and judging by the response, it looks like they've succeeded. But while publicity is great, the new Motorola Razr's innovative yet strange design warrants a closer look.

As one might expect, the most eye-catching feature of the new Razr is its folding display. Rather than having a single screen like its predecessor, the Razr boasts a fully flexible screen. While this type of screen isn't exactly new, it also innovates on the concept by creating a pocket of air around the seam that forms as the screen closes. This pocket of air formed within a gap in the case allows it to fully close, leaving the closed case completely flat unlike similar phones like the recent Samsung Galaxy Fold which is asymmetrical when closed.

Unfortunately (or fortunately depending on your perspective) to make this clean closed design feasible, the 2020 Motorola Razr looks rather unorthodox when opened. Naturally, to achieve a similar form factor to the closed Motorola Razr, it's necessary for the 2020 Razr to have a similar shape when opened. This results in an odd, long and thin design that is ubiquitous to flip phones but practically unheard of when it comes to modern smartphones. And to cleanly fold the screen in half, the bottom of the case has a raised bump in which

the top screen rests when the phone is closed, which the original Razr also had. With these traits in mind, it's fairly obvious that Motorola is intent on the 2020 Razr being a faithful recreation of the classic Razr, even if the end result looks bizarre compared to other modern smartphones.

Whether or not you see the design of the 2020 Razr, it is clear to see that it was ultimately designed to be a nostalgia trip and a throwback to the cell phones of old. While it may deviate from the core design principles of modern smartphones, this can easily be justified by pointing out that this deviation is the point! However, this raises questions as to whether or not it's worth it to buy a smartphone that costs over \$1,000 when it looks to emulate obsolete design principles; especially when more modern smartphones are a fraction of the cost. However, if the 2020 Motorola Razr appeals to you, be sure to look out for its release in mid-November 2020.
